Laurel Barr, MD:

I have been practicing Emergency Medicine in various settings in Ohio for the past 10 years. During this time, my patients have suffered from inefficiencies and inequalities in ourhealth care system, many accelerated by the pandemic. Often, by the time a patient becomes an emergency room patient the health care system has already failed them, and I cannot help them without proper tools, resources, and staff around me. This inspired me to be a member and advocate through the Ohio State Medical Association as well as the American Medical Association. Last year, I served as the OSMA delegate from the American College of Emergency Physicians and as Ohio Alternate Delegate to the AMA. This work has allowed me to be an advocate for my patients and myself. I feel this is even more important in the current political climate.
